PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE On Happiness

The feeling of happiness is fickle. We live in an age when everyone is desperately trying to be happy, but few seem to find that illusive state. The Hebrew word for happiness (אֶשֶׁר) **'ešer** means a state of bliss. The Bible says much on the subject.

Moses, commending faith in Jehovah writes:

Happy art thou, O Israel: who is like unto thee, O people saved by theLORD, the shield of thy help, and who is the sword of thy excellency!(Deuteronomy 33:29a)

Job made this profound statement:

Behold, happy is the man whom God correcteth: therefore despise not thou the chastening of the Almighty: For he maketh sore, and bindeth up: he woundeth, and his hands make whole.

David said much about happiness:

As arrows are in the hand of a mighty man; so are children of the youth. Happy is the man that hath -- his quiver full of them ... (Psalm 127:4-5) ... yea, happy is that people, whose God is the LORD (Psalm 144:15)

Solomon, in his Proverbs, tells us that happiness is connected to wisdom (3:13), to being merciful (14:21), to being sensitive to God (28:14), and to obeying the law (29:18). Jesus says that happiness and obedience to God's Word are linked (John 13:17).

James and Peter in their epistles say that if we suffer for the Gospel's sake we should be happy (in a state of bliss) because it means we are living and suffering like Jesus (James 5:11, 1 Peter 3:14, 4:14).

Every day will not be filled with bliss, but happiness can be found in each day, through each moment, as we trust in the Lord. Great difficulties come, horrific events happen, tragedies befall us, and sorrow can fill a day, but happiness should be the underlining emotion that flows from the joy of our salvation.

Happiness may flee at times but it will return as we rehearse eternal things, the things of God. Like anyone else, I often loose sight of the big picture and begin to dwell on the terrible events of life, the struggles of those around me, and my own shortcomings. As a pastor, I am burdened by the deep valleys experienced by some church families. When I begin to feel overwhelmed I am reminded that the source of happiness in this life is my Lord! He is my shield, the Wisdom of the ages, the one whom I love, fear, and obey.

We can be happy because God is by our side!

A BRIEF HISTORY OF GREAT REVIVALS A Continuing Series

THE WELSH REVIVAL

Spiritual revivals have been interwoven with the life of God's people since the days of Abraham, who believed God and followed Him. Throughout the tumultuous history of Israel there was continuing evidence of God's life-giving and superintending presence until the first outpouring of the Holy Spirit in Jerusalem that marked the birth of the Christian church 2000 years ago.

Almost every generation, in every nation where the Gospel has been received, has since then experienced some tangible form of God's close and often miraculous interventions in the lives of those whom He has redeemed.

The 1904-1905 Welsh Revival was one such intervention, mentioned here because it was so well documented, so spectacular, so controversial and ultimately had such a far reach to countries and communities around the world, including the United States where it kindled a flame in the Appalachian region amongst the Welsh settlers.

The Welsh love to sing, and to this day they love to sing the old-time hymns (as evidenced by glorious and continuous hymn singing by great crowds at major rugby games), although the modern Welsh, though delightful people, are generally quite profane. The grand old hymn, "Here is love, vast as the ocean" was closely associated with the revival that began 118 years ago and spread to meetings taking place across Wales night after night, with fervent prayer and passionate singing and total disregard for the time. Gatherings sometimes lasted from sunset to sunrise, exciting many, frightening some, and causing deep concern amongst others. In little over a year, 100,000 people had made commitments to Jesus Christ.

Whole communities changed. Bars closed, crime fell, deep tunnels in the coal pits became occasional chapels, and the little horses that hauled the

underground coal trains no longer responded to instructions from the miners because their once filthy language had been sanitized.

The long-term consequences were felt as far afield as Korea and India, France and North America,. In Wales the fires died down after about a year and church services reverted to quiet respectability.

A local pastor wrote about the revival, noting that his church had been privileged to share in a "strange but life-changing movement of God [...] Drunkards and the most hopeless types became holy men, backsliders returned to the fold, men who had only professed religion entered into its power, and they are with us still, and by the Grace of God will remain faithful unto death."
