On Growth

A BRIEF HISTORY OF GREAT REVIVALS

It doesn't take much reading of Scripture or of human history to discover that God's answer to rampant wickedness and confusion is to bring spiritual revival (*Isaiah 59:19*).

But what is "spiritual revival"? And how can we experience it? Paul's declaration to the Philippians, that he seeks nothing in this life but to know Christ and the power of His resurrection, answers both questions. The need for revival from God, the giver of life, is always with us as a pressing necessity – and possibility. From the moment of birth descendants of Adam drift towards lifelessness. This downward spiral or "entropy" is something we share with all creation. Everything in the universe is always moving from order to disorder and decay.

On a spiritual level, our carnal nature alienated from the life of God drives us towards sin and death. Only spiritual rebirth can reverse this process. Even then, after we are born again by the Spirit of the Living God, the downward pull of corruption in our fallen human nature requires continual refreshment by the Spirit of Life to maintain an upward trajectory towards God. Where there is no refreshing, we gradually experience a type of death in our spirit. When the condition exists in most members of a congregation, the church itself – a "body of believers" – begins to die. Revival restores, resurrects, and renews both individuals and churches.

Many revivals are recorded in Scripture. The greatest of all Old Testament revivals happened with the first Passover in Egypt, when an entire nation was liberated from bondage and impelled by miraculous intervention towards their Promised Land. In the days of the Judges, periods of spiritual decline would be followed by seasons of quickening. In the days of the Kings, revival swept across the land of Israel under David and Solomon. After the nation was split, brief revivals in Judah came under Asa, Jehoshaphat, Hezekiah, and Josiah. When Judah again backslid into idolatry God judged them by the hand of the Babylonians. Then revival came through Nehemiah and Ezra who led the people back to their land to restore Jerusalem and the Temple.
