Return Blessing for Cursing

"If you can keep your head when all about you men are losing theirs and blaming it on you, if you can trust yourself when all men doubt you, but make allowance for their doubting too...you'll be a man, my son."

Those were the words of Rudyard Kipling, 18th century English poet and writer perhaps best known to American children in a different context, as the author of "The Jungle Book" that tells the story of a young boy adopted by wolves who makes friends of bears and tigers.

ENCOUNTERS:

LIVING AS A CHRISTIAN IN A POST-CHRISTIAN WORLD

Here we share anecdotes from church members about their experiences (inspirational, amusing, or sad) as Christians living in a world that is hostile to the Gospel. This month's story from Glenn Le Page, our missionary to the island of Guernsey, tells the remarkable story of a childhood friend's dramatic encounter with Jesus Christ.

Glenn took his family back to the birthplace he had left to live in America where he met and married Cher, and then both met their Savior. Soon, Glenn felt God calling him: "Go home to thy friends and tell them how great things the Lord hath done for thee" (Mark 5:19).

It has not been easy. The island is socially isolated, its people are hardened to the Gospel, and Glenn had left behind a reputation for antisocial behavior (to put it politely). Yet there have been some notable highlights, not least of which was the salvation of his 90-year-old mother, who died four years later. Glenn had the joy of preaching her funeral, with all the members of his large Guernsey family in attendance. More than 20 other Gurns (yes, that's what the locals call themselves) have been saved under their ministry, and Glenn recently met a close friend from the wild days of his youth who shared the following story of his own salvation.

Gareth was born into a Christian family but by the time of his teen years had drifted into a lifestyle centered on pubs and partying. The only thing he took seriously was "shore fishing" from the rocky coastline, often fishing all night long in all weathers. On December 30^{th,} 1980, one of those overnight fishing trips with three friends changed his life. Nigel was a newcomer to the group and around midnight went off on his own to find a better fishing spot. The friends left with Gareth started talking about life after death, a topic that made him uneasy. Later they noticed Nigel making his way back to them by the light of a lantern. As he sat beside Gareth he said, "I want to talk to you about Christianity".

"I was absolutely gobsmacked (stunned)!" Gareth recounted. "I told him we had just been talking about life after death. He responded by saying he had been praying for me and felt that the time was right to talk to me. One of his first questions was, if I died that night would I go to heaven?

I said I was brought up in a Christian home and he replied that my lifestyle showed I wasn't a Christian. I didn't know Jesus as my personal Savior. At that point I said I wanted to stop the discussion. A few hours later I went home to bed."

He hardly slept. It was New Year's Eve, and Gareth had planned to see the new year in at a local nightclub. Instead, he went to a church and joined their midnight service! "It seemed a strange place to see the new year in, but it also felt so right," he commented. When the pastor made an altar call, Gareth was the first to respond, praying the sinner's prayer just past midnight. Later, he went back to his local pub and told them he would not be attending there anymore because he would be attending church instead. A year after getting saved, he went to the New Year's Eve church service and there he met the woman he would soon marry!

Gareth and Glenn have renewed their friendship and rejoice in the fact that once they both lived to party, but now they live for Jesus Christ!

BIBLE QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Answering your particular questions while also providing an information resource for our church family. This month's topic is the Holy Spirit. Pastor Zach Kirchner shares his insights.

If I asked which member of the Trinity you feel you know the least, the answer would likely be, the Holy Spirit. The reason may be that Scripture contains less explicit revelation regarding the Holy Spirit than either the Father or the Son.

Yet it's important to know about the Holy Spirit because He makes the Trinity personal to the believer. For you and me today, He is the member of the Trinity who is with us. Jesus no longer walks the earth, the Father is on His throne in the heavens, but the Spirit resides *within* every believer!

From our perspective, the Holy Spirit's work is the most prominent and is *very* consequential for believers. But we must note that both secular and sacred culture emphasize experiences which ultimately stem from mysticism, and that's not how the Holy Spirit operates. So who is He, and what does He do?

We must begin by acknowledging that the Holy Spirit is God, and He is a unique Person within the Trinity.

In Acts chapter 5:3-4, Peter asks Ananias and Sapphira why they lied to the Holy Spirit, and then Peter adds, "thou hast lied. . . unto God."

Other references make it plain that the Holy Spirit is not a mysterious "essence" of either the Father or the Son—He has thoughts (Romans 8:26–27), He has emotions (Ephesians 4:30), and He exercises his will (1 Corinthians 12:11).

Just as we often identify ourselves by what work we do or what sports we play, we can identify the Holy Spirit based by what He does. His work in the Old Testament (e.g., Genesis 1:2, Exodus 35:30–35) is less often revealed than His work in the New Testament. Today He still works in tandem with the Word of God to give us wisdom and direction (John 14:26, Romans 8:14), and convicts the world of sin, righteousness, and pending judgment (John 16:8–11). The Holy Spirit also is the one who helps believers to understand Scripture (1 Corinthians 2:10–14), who seals and assures believers of their salvation (Ephesians 4:30, Romans 8:16), and who intercedes for us when we pray for help (Romans 8:26–27). A final major role is that the Spirit is the one who distributes a unique combination of spiritual gifts to every believer.

Some people have turned the Holy Spirit into a mystical being who is the source of "other tongues" and communicates in visions and "promptings." But the truth is less sensational and more wonderful! For every true believer, the Spirit resides in us and His work is not mystical. When we appreciate the breadth of who the Spirit is and what He does for us every minute of every day, we will not have extra-biblical expectations but will rely on Him to be our Comforter just as Jesus promised us (John 15–17):

If you love me, keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him; but ye know him, for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you.
